Duquesne Partnership Establishes Vital Band Program



St. Benedict the Moor opened in its current Watt Street location ten years ago, under the leadership of Mrs. Joelynn Parham. As part of the transition to the new space, McAuley Ministries gave a grant to the school for the purpose of establishing an instrumental music program. A band program had long been a dream of Mrs. Parham's but how to create the program from scratch? Enter Duquesne University with its talented faculty and students. From this partnership, one of the most beneficial programs for students and partners within the Extra Mile Schools was born.

of music education at Duquesne, four to five college students gain the opportunity to manage a classroom of budding musicians at St. Benedict each year. These students range from sophomores to seniors and have eyes toward careers in music education. First, they are interviewed. Those who make the cut develop lesson plans and conduct practices as professionals. Each student is responsible for a section of the band. Practices are scheduled between their courses. These students develop an essential base of field experience that leads them to be excellent student teachers. Their time with the St. Benedict band is invaluable, as it is to the students of St. Ben's.

In third grade, the kids are introduced to many different instruments and select one to learn. The following year they begin playing. The band includes students from fourth to eighth grade. They perform two concerts; a holiday winter concert and a big concert in the spring, which is often held on Duquesne's campus. This gives the students a glimpse of college life and a day to feel like a superstar.

Duquesne's music department performs for them, and after dinner, they change into formal concert attire for their own performance – and it's always a packed house. Family, faculty, and friends gather to support the band as well as the student mentors. It's a big night for everybody in the program.



Without the support of Mrs. Parham, Duquesne's faculty, the sponsors and volunteers, the band at St. Benedict would not be possible. All in all, over fifty student mentors and five hundred students have played a part in the band, and have continued on to be successful musicians and educators alike. We are proud of and grateful for this vital program and are excited for many more years of their music to come!
